Purpose: Adult education programs in Michigan assist in building skills and earning credentials that lead to postsecondary education, sustainable employment, and economic self-sufficiency.

Employer Skill Needs: In 2020, 65% of all jobs in the United States will require some level of postsecondary education. Priority sectors in Michigan include agriculture, construction, energy, healthcare, hospitality, information technology, manufacturing, and skilled trades.

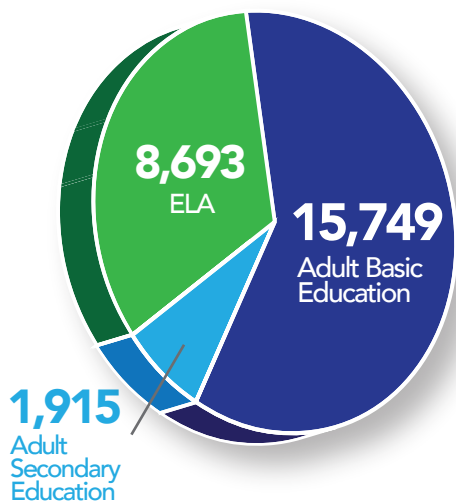
