In fact, he graduated with high honors and was awarded the departmental award from his welding department.

Today, Raymond has his high school equivalency degree, and he works as a structural welder for Matrix Services at BP Cherry Point Refinery. Raymond's hard work alongside tuition assistance and the I-BEST program helped him to find an engaging career that utilizes his greatest talents. ■
